Reflection for Sunday


"Peace be with you" (John 20 : 19,21,26)

It seemed much more appropriate to be journeying through Lent whilst being in lockdown than it has been to celebrate Easter in lockdown – in Lent we read Psalms of lament and longing and our Bible readings were those set in slavery and exile. Now in the Easter season we are reading of surprises, rejoicing and new beginnings – yet we still wait in lockdown, not knowing when or how our new post-COVID beginnings will come. But a closer reading of the Gospel Resurrection stories reveal that they were circumstances of confusion and disbelief. In today's Gospel the disciples have locked themselves in, they are fearful and uncertain of the future, then Jesus stands in the midst of them and proclaims repeatedly "Peace be with you." But this is not the quiet peace of a status quo, it is a disruptive but yet a reassuring peace - Jesus is Risen – It is the beginning of something new – Things can never be the same again.

I have been astounded during these weeks of lockdown, how Scripture speaks into this time with fresh layers of meaning and relevance. Ancient words of lament, of faith, of truth that speak God's presence into our current situation. "Lord you sometimes speak in wonders" is one of the songs that had been set for us this Sunday had we been gathered at St Mary's, it proclaims the wonder of Easter, the necessity of stillness and the relevance of God's word.

"Peace be with you" the Risen Christ's greeting that was and is both disruptive and reassuring. Christ speaks those words into our uncertainty, our fears, our being locked in. And just as Christ offered his wounded hands and feet and side to Thomas, struggling between faith and doubt, so he offers his wounded hands to us – to comfort, to strengthen, to disquiet and to reassure - as we find our way through this time. In addition, in these Sundays after Easter our attention is called to the Bible reading from Acts – Peter's great proclamation of the truths of the Christian faith, and now more than ever its good to hear again these eternal unchanging truths, the facts of Jesus' life, death and resurrection "written that you might believe...and that by believing you may have life in his name (John 20:31)

*Lord, you sometimes speak in wonders
unmistakable and clear;
mighty signs to prove your presence,
overcoming doubt and fear.
Lord, you sometimes speak in whispers,
still and small and scarcely heard;
only those who want to listen
catch the all-important word.
Lord, you love to speak in Scripture:
words that summon from the page,
shown and taught us by your Spirit
with fresh light for every age.
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When we can't seem to find the right words to express our thoughts and feelings, we can use the prayers that others have written to speak for us "The Corners" has been one such prayer for me so I share it with you here – it also echoes the words of the hymn "Great is thy faithfulness"

Dear God,
Some of us are exhausted by a constant stream of
bad news.
Some of us are exhausted from the effort of trying to
not freak out.
Some of us are exhausted by not knowing how we
will pay rent.
Some of us are exhausted from the effort of trying to

who are stuck at home.
Some of us are exhausted by the 13 hour shifts in a
hospital we no longer recognize, working a job we
are afraid might kill us.
Some of us showed up to this pandemic with
pre-existing physical and mental health conditions
that were already exhausting.
Some of us are exhausted by loneliness.
Some of us are exhausted by waiting so long for a
new season of Succession.
And some of us are exhausted by the effort of trying
to make this all ok for everyone else.
Life is so strained and tender right now.
I know that not a single one of us is promised
another day, God.
But I guess I am asking for the strength for just the
one we are in.
Give us today our daily strength.
Strength for today, and if you could spare it, bright
hope for tomorrow.
