Reflection by Claire

We all like a good story be it a film we can lose ourselves in or a book we can't put down. Something that captivates our imagination and transports us into another world. I wonder what kind of story you enjoy, is it a romance, a tragedy, a mystery? What makes a good story, is it the plot, how it has been written, the style, the substance, the twist at the end? Our lives are essentially a story, a tapestry of different chapters and events. Joys and tragedies which all mesh together to form something of who we are, what our lives are about. Jesus knew the power of telling stories, he would often captivate the crowds and also challenge the ruling class with his parables. They were a way of Jesus being able to communicate the deeper truths of the kingdom of God. Truths which are difficult to explain other than in the form of a story.

Sometimes the stories we tell are just fragments of a whole, but these fragments offer us glimpses of a truth and a hope and point us towards the One source of life.

The readings from Matthew offer us a series of stories ... the kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, a grain of yeast, a hidden treasure, a pearl of great price, a fishing net ... They are all written to help us to engage in the work of the Kingdom of God. The hidden wisdom of God, the wisdom that Solomon asked of Yahweh for, more than earthly riches: 'give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people' (1 Kings 3.9). It is this wisdom which we so need now to navigate our way through the choppy seas of this current age with all the uncertainty and challenges it holds for us.

The Muslim community have just begun their festival of Hajj. In which millions of Muslims would have gone on pilgrimage to Mecca but this year only a few hundred will be participating. The festival is one which is a great leveller when all Muslims journey side by side regardless of status, stripped down before God or all the trappings that they hold in life. For many of us we don't need to go on a pilgrimage this year to feel that we are stripped down and vulnerable before God. The effects of the last few months and the ongoing crisis will have caused us all to reflect more deeply on what is important in life and in our faith tradition.

As we begin very tentatively to regroup as a Christian community it will be the stories that we share that will help us to understand more of the nature and the purposes of God's kingdom amongst us. As we come back together again, we can also begin to tell new stories and within these stories hope will be found. A hope which can sustain us and nurture us and also teach us of the wisdom of the kingdom of God.

As we start meeting together again we will recognise that things are not quite what they used to be, there is a strangeness to how we do things: sanitisers, facemasks and keeping a distance are our new normal. But all these practices keep us apart (which is their intention). So, the challenge for us as a Christian community is how to we gather back together well, how do we create community. I suggest it is through story and beginning with our own story ... I wonder what wisdom and treasure your story may hold? "The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in their joy goes and sells all that they have and buys the field" (Matt 13.44).
